AUTONOMOUS VEH REQUIREMENTS

Summary

This bill defines autonomous vehicles and sets requirements for their operation in Illinois, including the need for a human safety operator.

Business Impact

If you operate autonomous vehicles in Illinois, you must ensure a human safety operator is present during transport or face penalties.

Key Provisions

- Defines 'autonomous vehicle' with specific criteria for operation.
- Requires compliance with federal standards for registered autonomous vehicles.
- Mandates the presence of a human safety operator for certain transport activities.
- Human safety operators must meet federal and state qualifications.
- Prohibits the use of autonomous vehicles for interstate commerce without a safety operator.
- Establishes a new article in the Illinois Vehicle Code specifically for autonomous vehicles.

Compliance Checklist

- Ensure a human safety operator is present during transport activities. | Who: Operators of autonomous vehicles. | Penalty: Potential penalties for non-compliance may apply.
- Verify that the human safety operator meets all federal and state qualifications. | Who: Operators of autonomous vehicles. | Penalty: Potential penalties for non-compliance may apply.
