HIGHLY AUTOMATED WORK ZONE VEH

Introduced

Amendment

Effective: Oct 01, 2023 | Last Action (Feb 18, 2020): Referred to Rules Committee

Summary

This bill establishes a pilot program for highly automated work zone vehicles in Illinois, defining their operation and oversight.

Business Impact

If you operate construction zones in Illinois, you must comply with new regulations on automated vehicles by establishing pilot programs or face penalties.

Key Provisions

- Defines 'highly automated work zone vehicle' and 'remote autonomous vehicle operator'.
- Exempts highly automated work zone vehicles from following too closely regulations.
- Establishes a 2-year pilot program for these vehicles under the Illinois State Toll Highway Authority.
- Requires annual reporting on the pilot program's effectiveness and safety outcomes.
- Allows local governments to deploy highly automated work zone vehicles.
- The pilot program is set to be repealed on January 1, 2024.

Compliance Checklist

- Establish a pilot program for highly automated work zone vehicles. | Who: Illinois State Toll Highway Authority and local governments. | Penalty: Potential loss of funding or support for non-compliance.
- Submit annual reports on the pilot program's outcomes. | Who: Illinois State Toll Highway Authority. | Penalty: Failure to report may lead to oversight actions by the General Assembly.
