The Artificial Intelligence Literacy Act establishes a grant program to improve AI literacy in education and community organizations across New York, with a reporting requirement for four years.

Business Impact

If you operate educational programs in New York, you must apply for AI literacy grants to enhance your curriculum by 2025 or risk losing funding opportunities.

Key Provisions

- Establishes an AI literacy program within the digital equity competitive grant program.
- Provides grants for teacher training and AI education resources in schools.
- Supports community organizations in developing AI educational programs.
- Requires annual reporting from grant recipients on fund usage and progress for four years.
- Focuses on outreach to underserved communities affected by the digital divide.
- Mandates the development of virtual learning platforms for AI education.
