Prohibits the state, state agencies and departments and contractors doing business with the state, its agencies or departments from retaining facial recognition images or sharing such images with third parties without legal authorization by a court.

Summary

This bill prohibits state entities from retaining or sharing various surveillance data, including facial recognition images, without court authorization.

Business Impact

If you operate a state agency in New York, you must not retain or share facial recognition images without court approval or face legal consequences.

Key Provisions

- Prohibits retention of various surveillance data without court authorization.
- Prevents sharing of such data with third parties without legal approval.
- Allows lawful storage of specific records obtained during criminal investigations.
